ANNUAL DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI DAY



The Rev. Dr. H. Richard McClain was honored with the **2016 Distinguished Alumni Award** on November 3, 2016 at the J.P. McCaskey High School celebration. Each year five individuals whose lives exemplify the excellence of the McCaskey High School Campus are honored by the McCaskey Alumni Association.

In November Rev. McClain was one of these honorees.

Rev. Dr. H. Richard McClain (class of 1956) has said that it was McCaskey High School that helped him develop an "I can" attitude. You need only glance at his list of accomplishments to see that Dick took this "I can" attitude into the world and gave it away to many others.

His life service began as a Marine and then as a public school teacher. He would soon receive an unexpected call to enroll at Lancaster Theological Seminary and Palmer Theological Seminary. He went on to serve congregations in the Presbyterian Church (USA) and the United Church of Christ. He was a frequent host of the WGAL Morning Devotions.

Rev. Dr. Richard McClain's ministry extended a long way beyond the pulpit. He has volunteered as a chaplain for the police departments of York City and West Hempfield Township, participated in child abuse awareness seminars, served as a director of Habitat for Humanity for ten years.

He has planned and participated in Katrina disaster relief mission trips and serves on the Presbyterian Disaster Assistance National Response Team. He is also the police chaplain for Upper Macungie Township.

Biography

The Reverend Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, II
Stated Clerk of the General Assembly, Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)

The Reverend Dr. J. Herbert Nelson, II serves as Stated Clerk of the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), the largest Reformed denomination in the United States. He was elected at the 222nd General Assembly (2016) in Portland, Oregon.

The son, grandson, and nephew of Presbyterian pastors, Nelson is the first African American to lead the denomination, which has a 300-year history in the U.S. As Stated Clerk his duties include interpreting assembly actions, representing the church on various denominational and ecumenical councils, witnessing on behalf of the church to social justice issues, and making statements as directed by an assembly.

Prior to becoming Stated Clerk, Nelson served as director of the PC(USA)'s Office of Public Witness in Washington, D.C. His service to the denomination also includes calls as pastor of St. James Presbyterian Church in Greensboro, North Carolina, and organizing pastor of Liberation Community Church in Memphis, Tennessee.

As an extension to his ministry in the PC(USA), Nelson served as associate director of the Benjamin L. Hooks Institute for Social Change at the University of Memphis. As a consultant, he provided staff development training for teacher specialists, curriculum specialists, and principal leaders who provide assistance for low-performing schools.

Nelson holds a Doctor of Ministry degree from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary; a Master of Divinity degree from Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary; and a Bachelor of Arts degree in Political Science/Urban Studies from Johnson C. Smith University.

He is a featured conference preacher and writer, and serves on various boards and professional organizations. His international travel includes trips to South Africa, Geneva, Switzerland, Montego Bay, Jamaica, and Havana, Cuba, on behalf of the PC(USA).

Nelson is married to the Reverend Gail Porter Nelson, and they have one adult daughter, Alycia Yvette Nelson.



We hope that all Clerks can be present. Moderators of Session are welcome to attend and participate, but their attendance is not mandatory. Many find this time helpful in their ministry as Moderator of Session.

2017 Boundary Training

The Presbytery shall provide access to annual educational programs to inform and to promote the prevention of sexual misconduct. **All Covered Persons shall be required to attend such programs every four years**, and at a minimum must review this policy annually and attest in writing that the policy has been reviewed.

Attendance and compliance records will be kept by the Stated Clerk. (Sexual Misconduct Policy of Lehigh Presbytery, adopted 25 January 2011).

In conjunction with our ecumenical partners, the Pennsylvania Northeast Conference of the United Church of Christ is hosting a Sexual Misconduct Prevention Workshop. Two all-day events are planned to help church leaders and members address topics that arise in your settings. These will also fulfill the every-four-year requirement for Lehigh Presbytery Teaching Elders, and be good education for others in your congregation.

According to the sexual misconduct policy passed by Lehigh Presbytery in 2011, **ALL** Teaching Elders and Commissioned Ruling Elders are required to complete healthy boundary training

- conducted in person (not electronic),
- and this must happen within four years.

Sowing the Future: Gifts of Abundance Grants

In recognition and honor of our region's continuing participation in world mission, we are offering every presbytery the opportunity for a matching grant of \$3,000 towards a world mission project or partnership of their choice.

Raise your grant by \$1,000 if you partner with another presbytery or use the funds towards something brand new or new within an existing relationship!

Presbyteries are invited to apply for a \$3,000 global mission grant to be used within existing mission partnerships that will:

- Help to facilitate partnership ministry projects already underway. We are looking for signs of clear partnership where mutual engagement is evident.
- Support ongoing global partnerships for learning, awareness and sharing on the part of all partners. We will be looking for evidence of how this relationship has impacted those who participate in ways that keep it ongoing.

Presbyteries who partner together for world mission projects or who undertake a new partnership or new aspect of a partnership will be eligible for an additional \$1,000 each.

The grant request must come from the presbytery and be used in a way that partnership participation is open to the whole presbytery. A presbytery may request for two different partnerships, but both must be a part of the original grant request and meet the criteria of the grant. This does not change the total dollar amount available to the presbytery.

Note: Only one application per presbytery may be submitted.

Freedom Grants

In response to the General Assembly priority around the plight of the African American male, we are offering grants to seed projects that relate to this concern across our communities. We will be offering six grants of \$5,000 (\$30,000 total). There will be a limit of one grant per city/municipality.

The 222nd General Assembly (2016) voted to "take specific action, not just in word, but also in deed, to address and improve the worsening plight of the African American male in any of the five specified cities as a pilot initiative pointing toward future and further nationwide intervention. Micah 6:8, with its powerful words to 'Do justice, love kindness and walk humbly [with your God],' calls us to action and not only proclamation."

While our congregations and presbyteries give to support the high calling of the General Assembly overture, The Synod of the Trinity encourages those areas of smaller African American populations to consider work that they might engage in to address the plight of African American males in their cities and towns.

Creative projects among congregations, between congregations and community agencies, or projects in partnership with local municipalities might be more important at this time than we can imagine. We will consider projects for a grant of \$5,000 and will be looking for projects that have a future trajectory with the potential for sustainability, and that actively engage members of a congregation. Projects developed earlier than Jan. 1, 2016 will not be considered. We encourage partnership and creativity with the African American male population being those primarily served.

The deadline for grant consideration is Friday, June 30, 2017. All signed applications must be in the Synod office by 4:30 p.m. on that date.


2017 Presbyterian Mission Yearbook for Prayer & Study

RULING ELDER PREPARATION

The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) holds fast to a representative form of government where ruling elders and teaching elders are elected to ordered ministry and share in ecclesial authority as, together, we seek to discern and represent the will of Christ in and through faithful service. To this end, “congregations should elect persons of wisdom and maturity of faith, having demonstrated skills in leadership and being compassionate in spirit” (*Book of Order*, G-2.0301).

Once a new class of ruling elders is elected by a congregation, the session is called upon to prepare these new leaders for service in the church. The responsibility for this time of study and preparation is sometimes delegated to a staff member, such as the pastor. But it is a responsibility of the session, acting as a whole, to prepare newly elected ruling elders for active participation in the leadership of the church. This training may include a review of:

- Biblical highlights of strong, courageous leaders (consider: Moses, David, Esther, Paul, Peter, etc.);
- Presbyterian polity and doctrine, including “The Marks of the Church” (F-1.0302), the “Notes of the Reformed Church” (F-1.0303), The Great Ends of the Church (F-1.0304), and the constitutional questions asked of ruling elders at their Installation (W-4.4003);
- An inventory of spiritual gifts and talents;
- The duties and procedures of ministry, both in general and within a given context;
- The intersection of life and faith, as it pertains to church leadership.

After a time of study is completed, it is expected that the session will examine new leaders as to their readiness for service (G-2.0402). This *examination* is not intended to be harsh or punitive, but to serve instead as a mutual discussion about the church, its mission, and leadership. All this is done in a spirit of peace and for the sake of a nurtured and healthy community of faith. “Teaching elders shall be committed in all their work to equipping the people of God for their ministry and witness” (F-3.0202). This examination might include questions about the candidate’s:

- Personal faith and spiritual maturity;
- Commitment to Christ and the Church;
- Willingness to serve;
- Openness to the guidance of the Holy Spirit in becoming “a community of faith, hope, love, and witness” (G-3.0201);
- Desire to work for peace in the face of change, and to seek unity in the midst of diversity;
- Knowledge of the Constitution of the church (doctrine, government, and discipline); and
- Understanding of the duties incumbent upon a ruling elder.

Along with teaching elders, ruling elders are called to be stewards of the faith and champions of the gospel. Those who are called will lead by example. So it best be a good example!

The Earl A. Pope Annual Guest Lecturer in World Christianity: Nonconformist Christianity in Africa's Cultural History

African theologians often argue that contemporary African Christianity is an outgrowth of older religious traditions. In this lecture I will argue that there was much that was strange, eccentric, and inconsistent about Christianity in colonial Africa. The lecture will focus on the reading habits and interpretive strategies that inspired Christian nonconformity. Nonconformists read the Bible idiosyncratically, snipping bits of text out of the fabric of the book and using these slogans to launch heretical and odd ways of living. Over time, some of Africa's nonconformists sought to position themselves in narrative structures that could authenticate and legitimate their dissident religious activity. That entailed experimentation with voice, positionality, and addressivity.

The Anatomy of Change

Throughout the traditional denominations of the western church the word 'change' both unites and polarizes people. There is general agreement that some things should change, but which things – music, liturgy, buildings, organizational structures? And when it comes to alternatives there is rarely unanimity. Yet, at the centre of the Christian faith is a God who changes (???), a Savior who is resurrected, and a Spirit intended to make all things new.

So, rather than become embroiled in the detail of which color to paint the women's restroom, in this retreat we will look at the anatomy of change and of resistance, identifying ways in which people – including ourselves – can understand and enable change to happen.
