## Presbytery Highlights

A significant highlight were the wonderfully delicious refreshments provided by our gracious hosts at College Hill Presbyterian Church. The gathering presbyters appreciated every bite.

Convened November 26, 2013 in the sanctuary of College Hill Presbyterian Church, Easton, Lehigh Presbytery conducted its routine business via the consent docket including:

- approval of Teaching Elder Steven H. Shussett to serve as advocate at the 2014 General Assembly for Overture 011 NC “On Amending W-4.9000 Concerning the Church’s Role in Legal Marriage and Services of Christian Covenant”—from the Lehigh Presbytery.
- appointment of Teaching Elder John Heinsohn as moderator of the Community Presbyterian Church of Mt. Bethel/Portland
- permission to Teaching Elder H. Richard McClain to labor outside the bounds of Lehigh Presbytery in Philadelphia Presbytery as temporary supply pastor for the Presbyterian Church on the Mall in Plymouth Meeting, PA.
- appointment of Teaching Elder Robert Mitchell as moderator of the Pleasant Valley Presbyterian Church of Brodheads ville
- approval of contractual details for Teaching Elder David Watson, Teaching Elder Laura Stone, Teaching Elder William Schram, and Teaching Elder Erika Beer-Gerhard
- Receipt of the October 2013 Treasurer’s report showing a overall (per capita and mission) net deficit of \$36,299.51

In our continuing efforts to discern who God is calling us to be today and into the future, Lehigh Presbytery has held a series of “engagements” during presbytery meetings. These are meant to help us listen to how God is at work in the world — and how we, as individuals and as churches, might cooperate. This time we gathered in four groups, representing the four geographic quadrants of

the Presbytery. We discussed community challenges and opportunities and the HOPE to which we feel called.

The Committee on Ministry recommended and Presbytery approved the appointment of an Administrative Commission to partner with the Session of White Haven Presbyterian Church. Commission members are Teaching Elders Katie Sundermeier (convener), Michael Drake and Ruling Elder Debbie Prince.

The Committee on Shared Gifts presented the slate for 2014 leadership, including David Boltz, Moderator and David Duquette, Vice Moderator. Lead Team members will be Class of 2014: Rev. RC Smith, Patricia Hoffman, Rev. Anne Huey. Class of 2015: Bob Nickels, Rev. Laura Stone, Sally Heimbach. Class of 2016: Robert Seitzinger, Rev. Timothy Dooner, Jack Felch.

Several important positions on the Committee on Ministry remain vacant. Elected as Commissioners to General Assembly were Rev. Jeff Colarossi, Ruling Elders Jack Felch and Christopher Dudley. Our Youth Advisory Delegate will be Christopher Palmer. The Committee on Shared Gifts was authorized to fill the Teaching Elder commissioner vacancy. Contact Sally Heimbach for further details.

In the second reading of the 2014 budgets for Presbytery and Camp Brainerd, there ensued a healthy, frank discussion regarding our future. Both budgets were approved, keeping the combined per-capita rate steady at \$27.13, with projected deficits to be covered from the Developer’s Fund.

The Presbytery concurred with an Overture from the Presbytery of Detroit to Amend G-3.0106 to Allow Presbyteries to Limit Payments of Per Capita.

The Presbytery adopted, on second reading, the revised Dismissal Policy which had been previously discussed in detail.

The meeting concluded following Worship during which we installed Ruling Elder David Boltz as Moderator and Teaching Elder David Duquette as Vice Moderator and shared in the Lord’s Supper.

**REV. A. SUZANNE BROOKS-COPE**—she is new in the Presbytery and serves as pastor to St. Matthews UCC in Kunkletown, PA. She has dual standing and is active in the Lehigh Presbytery and Penn Northeast Conference of the UCC. You may have met her at one of our Presbytery meetings.

**REV. SAMEH SHAKAR BAKHEET**—he is also new to the Presbytery and serves as Chaplain at the Berks County Residential Center and at Doylestown Hospital. He also volunteers as Chaplain at the Reading Health System. Rev. Bakheet was born in Egypt and immigrated to the United States three years ago.



**REV. GREG PALMER**—continues to function as pastoral clinician among the Allentown Associates in Psychiatry. He also serves as moderator to the session of the First Presbyterian Church in Hazleton and leads worship. He also preaches as a pulpit supply to the churches in Lehigh Presbytery. Rev. Palmer founded and serves as professional advisor to the Lehigh Valley Chapter of the Depression and Bipolar Support Alliance and in his spare time he is a Parish Associate at the First Presbyterian Church of Allentown.



**REV. GRACE JI-SUN KIM**—has been called to minister and teach. Her teaching and research explores liberation theology and how we can help the disenfranchised, the oppressed and the marginalize. She has taught at Moravian Theological Seminary as an Associate Professor of Theology. She attends and participates at the Korean Church of the Lehigh Valley.



**REV. DR. STEVEN H. SHUSSETT**—serves as Teaching Presbyter and Stated Clerk to the Lehigh Presbytery. He writes for Congregational Ministries Publishing, serves as adjunct faculty for Moravian Theological Seminary and is a Spiritual Director. He works with the congregations of the Presbytery and provides leadership training and supplies their pulpits when needed. He also leads worship at The Cave.

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## Rhythm of the Synod

*faith notes from the Stated Meeting of the Synod of the Trinity - October 28-29, 2013*

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Can you imagine a Synod meeting where more time is spent in round table discussions, worship and singing than long reports and budget considerations? If you find that unimaginable you would have been greatly surprised by the October 28-29, 2013 meeting of the Synod of the Trinity.

The last two meetings of the Synod have been designed by the expanded leadership team to significantly increase the time the Commissioners spend in worship, singing and table discussions. The purpose of the redesign is to increase the role of the Commissioners in visioning and implementing a new model for regional mission and ministry.

Yes, the structure and configuration of synods may be altered by actions of the 221st General Assembly when it considers the report and recommendations of the Mid-Council Commission II. Rather than sit around and wait for the Assembly's action, the Synod of the Trinity is seeking how we can be better stewards of the mission and resources God has given us for the present and future.

Mr. Phil Bergey was engaged as a facilitator for the Synod's consideration of a policy based governing pattern. In this model the Commissioners establish policies with specific end results to be more faithful to what God is calling the Synod to be and do. The Synod's focus is to be more responsible to the needs, challenges and opportunities of our presbyteries and the region as a whole. Once such policies are developed, it will be the responsibility of the staff to carry out the administrative details and processes to move toward the accomplishment of the policy goals established by the Commissioners in their collective capacity as the Synod.

One Commissioner described the meeting as like a revival. Zach Maser led the music with a soft touch on his guitar strings.

Using a consent agenda for the approval and reception of many reports and recommendations, the Synod approved the review of presbytery records, 2014 Synod meeting dates, the 2014 Synod Budget and several other items.

Action Items approved by the Synod were:

- A revision to the Synod Scholarship policy
- The report of the Nomination Committee, including the election of Jim Robinson as Moderator and Barbara Chaapel as Vice Moderator
- A revised position description for the Stated Clerk
- 2014 terms of call for all staff
- Authorized the appointment of a Stated Clerk search committee
- Approved the request of Synod Executive, Bruce Stevens to be released from his call as executive, effective 31 July 2014 so he may retire.
- Approved the appointment of a transition task group to recommend a model for transitional leadership

The Commissioners left the meeting with energy and enthusiasm. This was not a typical Synod meeting of the past. A primary point for consideration at the February 2014 Synod Meeting will be the role of the Commissioners and their relationship to their sending presbyteries.

To all the Saints of the Lehigh Presbytery,

Grace to you all, and peace!

The Presbytery, just like your congregation, is in the midst of thinking ahead to what the future holds and how we might be asked to contribute to the upbuilding of the Kingdom of God. Some things we know we will be doing or asked to do, others things we have to prepare for — just in case — and still other matters will come as a total surprise. Your generosity, directly or through your congregation, is what enables the gifts of the whole Presbytery, as well as the Synod and General Assembly, to come to bear in a way that no one congregation could do on its own.

**Per Capita could be called the *Presbyterian Covenant Community Fund*.**

As the Office of the General Assembly writes,

*Per capita is a fundamental way in which all of the nearly 11,000 congregations and mid councils of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) are connected and participate in the work of the wider church.*

*Because it is rooted in the connectional and covenantal nature of the Presbyterian church, as affirmed by the ordination vows taken by elders and ministers of the Word and Sacrament, per capita could be called the **Presbyterian Covenant Community Fund**.*

### Mission Dollars at Work

According to the Presbyterian Mission Agency,

*Stewardship is how we use our God-given gifts; it is how we use our talents, our time, and our treasure. It is the way we use all our resources to carry on Christ's work of reconciliation in the world. Stewardship is more than money. Stewardship is how we live out our calling as followers of Christ. Stewardship is what we do after we say that we believe.*

**Your contributions are so important to these efforts, being Christ's hands and feet here in our community and beyond !**

While there are many things that congregations can and do pursue through their particular efforts, many of these are enhanced by the ways in which others join them in prayer and action. Often it is the Presbytery that communicates the good news and the opportunities, the needs for prayer and service.

Here are just some of the ways that **your generosity touches the lives of Lehigh Presbyterians and beyond:**

- \* **Helping Hands** has been an important ministry for the many in need — and for the many who in eight years have gone on trips to rebuild disaster-affected areas around the country. The best image the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) has **around the world** is the blue t-shirts of Presbyterian Disaster Assistance, and Helping Hands is our contribution to that effort. The Presbytery office staff helps to coordinate these efforts and make travel arrangements with your per capita dollars, even as churches and outside donors support these trips with their mission dollars. The Presbytery has also frequently led services to commission and bless those about to go out as Christ's hands and feet in the world.
- \* Just as you look for pastoral support from your pastor in times of struggle, need or even joy, your pastor can need a listening ear. Have you wondered where your pastor might find that support? As people like you, with highs and lows, your pastor can turn to our **Teaching Presbyter**. He is the pastor to the pastors, a sounding board for dreams and difficulties, a partner with whom to pray. Contributions from you and our churches, in conjunction with the

national church's Board of Pensions', also make possible the Pastors' Emergency Fund, through which your pastor might receive financial assistance when times are particularly tough.

- \* In 2013 Lehigh Presbytery hosted an experiment that benefitted both the Presbytery and the Synod of the Trinity:

the Rev. Dr. Brett Hendrickson (member of the Presbytery and faculty member at Lafayette College) led a **presentation on the Heidelberg Catechism** in preparation for the national vote on this chapter in our Book of Confessions. Thanks to Brett, the Synod, and a lot of administrative and technological work, this was available for the entire Synod of the Trinity.

- \* Congregations often ask the Presbytery or the Teaching Presbyter to provide **training or leadership**, often several joining together for one event. As part of its educational and pastoral ministry, it is not unusual for the Presbytery to take on the administrative costs in materials, preparation, support, and leadership.
- \* And for those events and requests open to the wider Presbytery, surface **mailings, the E-News, monthly Messenger, newsletter, prayer requests, and Facebook** all take resources of time, energy, and material.
- \* **Pastors retreats** are days that are planned once or twice a year to give the ministers in our Presbytery a chance to take a day to refresh and renew. We have an array of topics and activities for the pastors to experience. Your dollars help to make sure this remains affordable for every one of our teaching elders and commissioned ruling elders.
- \* How often it is said that the youth are the future of the church? **Presbyterian Youth Triennium** is a gathering of Presbyterian youth from around the country who converge on Purdue University for five days of worship, fellowship, learning and growing. This event happens every three years and Lehigh Presbytery sets aside a portion of its mission budget each year in order to help defray the cost of this event. - \* **Camp Brainerd** serves our youth and young adults, helping some to continue their spiritual growth and others who do not know Christ, a chance to meet him in a safe and non-judging place. It is also where our future leaders of the Presbyterian Church learn responsibility and accountability for themselves and for others. This year Brainerd added a day camp, anticipating that many of those participating will one day sleep over. Your mission dollars go to help support and keep the camp running for future generations.

- When the Presbytery was asked to sponsor a hunger-related event taking place in one of our congregations and open to the broader community, the door opened to something more. Your leadership committed \$10,000 of our **mission dollars to fight hunger** in our Presbytery's bounds, and planning is already underway on how that will happen next year.

- While **C Change** is not funded by per capita or mission dollars, the means to foster growth of new Christian communities and encourage our existing churches to reach out to their communities has come at a significant cost of administrative time and energy. Thus far \$15,000 has been allocated for efforts in Emmaus, Pen Argyl, and Easton, with a number of other possible projects emerging.

**What does the Presbytery do?** These are just a few ways your per capita and mission dollars are used. None of this could have happened without someone to plan, arrange, implement and communicate each of these.

Your mission and per capita dollars are so important to continue and begin these and other ministries!
