Korean Church of the Lehigh Valley installs a new Pastor Welcome Rev. John Lee!

More than four hundred people attended the installation of the Reverend John Lee as Pastor of the Korean Church of the Lehigh Valley in Whitehall, PA, on November 15, 2015.

Notable guest speakers included the Reverends Jonathan Song, Heeyoi Park, Hyun Soo Bae, and Young Choon Chang—all pastors of leading congregations on the East Coast. The Reverend Song, Senior Pastor of the Church of Philippi, Hanover, MD, preached the sermon.



The Choir of the Church of Philippi traveled from the Washington, DC area to perform two lively contemporary choruses. Traditional choral numbers were sung by the Choir of the Korean Church of the Lehigh Valley. Four of KCLV's ruling elders, Kyung Chun, Charles Yun, Kwangyun Byun, Kijo Lee, led the worship service, which concluded with Reverend John Lee's benediction.



The Administrative Commission appointed for this occasion by Lehigh Presbytery was led by the Presbytery's Moderator, the Reverend David Duquette, Pennside Presbyterian Church of Reading, who asked Reverend Lee the Presbyterian Church (USA) installation questions. These questions, and Reverend Lee's responses, were followed by the traditional laying on of hands, in which all teaching and ruling elders in attendance were invited to participate.

The Lehigh Presbytery's Commission for the Reverend Lee's installation included Ruling Elder Marsha Heimann, Stated Clerk of the Presbytery, Ruling Elder Suk Won Lee of the Korean Church of the Lehigh Valley, and the Reverends Carol Brown and Matilda Chase, honorably retired.

The service was followed by a sumptuous banquet, to which all worshipers were invited.

A Congregation with the Heart of God



The congregation of the United Presbyterian Church of Pottsville recognizes that it is blessed with a large space and like many other congregations; they are looking forward to the day when the pews will once again be filled. In the meantime, they continue to set their hands and hearts about the work of God.

Their drive stems from the teachings as found in Micah 6:8, "*what does the LORD require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?*"

They have taken this passage to heart and discerned that for today, it is a call to relationships. Relationships that are among and between those already inside the church walls, but also and equally important, this is a call to foster and develop relationships with those located outside of the walls of the church. Rising to this challenge, they are not content to leave this missional thought as merely a thought, or simply as words scribed to paper, but in fact to take action.

The leadership team, the Session, has most recently voted in favor of opening the doors of the church as an emergency shelter for the homeless. They are partnering with My Father's House, a mission of Servants for All located on Centre Street, Pottsville.

This is merely one more step in their journey to build relationships of care and value. This ministry builds upon some already tremendous mission work there; from hosting the home site for the Schuylkill Choral Society, a meeting site for the Local Housing Options Team, AA meetings- 3x times a week, as well as operating a weekly food pantry, cooking and serving monthly meals for the local soup kitchen, to now becoming host of an emergency housing shelter. Additional discussions and discernment are ongoing for reaching out to build friendships and mentorships among teenage and young moms by partnering with a program called Mothers of Preschoolers.

What tremendous glories of God are happening through the members of the Pottsville church.

New Camp Director at Camp Kirkwood



The Kirkwood-Brainerd Transition Team is pleased to announce the hiring of Tommy Campbell for the position of Camp Director for Camp Kirkwood, a joint ministry of the Philadelphia and Lehigh presbyteries, effective January 1, 2016.

You can meet Tommy at the February 23, 2016 Lehigh Presbytery Meeting. Come early and chat with him at registration. It is going to be an exciting camping season and he will be there to share his enthusiasm for this year.

Tommy's background is well suited to the responsibilities of Camp Director at Kirkwood. He has a B.A. in Religion/Music (voice) from the University of Mary Washington and has been around Christian camping for much of his life. After growing up as a camper, he was a summer staff and retreat assistant at Massanetta Springs (Synod of the Mid-Atlantic, PCUSA) and worked at Meadowkirk (National Capital Presbytery, PCUSA), carrying out supervision of various camp activities, including that of Camp Director. His experience at Meadowkirk also included working with inner city children from Washington, D.C. He gained valuable management, communication and business experience as a Marriot restaurant manager. Most recently he was employed by Camp Hanover (Presbytery of the James, PCUSA). A former employer noted, "I think Tommy's biggest strength is his passion and enthusiasm for summer camp ministry." The Search Committee recognized that passion and is excited about possibilities that will exist with Tommy Campbell as director.

The Search Committee executed a national search for this position and after looking at more than 30 candidates, unanimously voted to extend the offer for Camp Director to Tommy. Gershon Gordon, the former Acting Camp Director, was invited to apply for the position but declined. We are grateful to Gershon for his good stewardship of the camp and our youth, and we look forward to a new season of Christian camping with Tommy Campbell.

POINT PLEASANT BEACH - HELPING HANDS TRIP OCTOBER 2015



On October 4-9, 2015 a team of 19 Helping Hands volunteers visited the Jersey Shore to continue rebuilding efforts from the damage of Hurricane Sandy. This week it will be three years since the storm hit and many have not returned to their homes. We felt much of their frustration talking to homeowners and relief organizations. On the eve of our trip, anxiety was really up as Hurricane Joaquin was potentially headed towards the east coast and many rushed to prepare with sandbags, boarding up of shops, etc. Thankfully,

damage was minimal and we only saw minor beach erosion and some coastal flooding.

Our teams supported "A Future of Hope", a Methodist relief organization. We assisted moving materials from their north location in Highlands New Jersey to the Atlantic City area, where most remaining rebuilding is required. Another team painted the entire interior of a home in Keansburg, NJ in just two days. This home is almost ready for them to move in after being elevated and completely rebuilt.



A team was dispatched to Tuckerton, NJ to spread 20 tons of crushed stone under a rebuilt elevated home also close to completion. With only two wheel barrows and mostly senior citizen workers, this was completed in one day.

Another team visited two homes in Atlantic City to paint the outside of a twin rebuilt home and to move furniture and help an elderly homeowner hang her precious Last Supper painting over her newly refurbished dining room. Eldora was a sweet lady in her 70's

with 26 grandchildren. She lives only three blocks from the boardwalk and high rise casinos.....quite a contrast from the humble row homes that Eldora and others live in.

Several of our team members worked on Brenda's home only about a mile from the Point Pleasant Presbyterian church where we were housed. Brenda is a single parent of a 10 year old boy who lost her business, a small printing and fax service as well as the damage to her home from flooding. Although she had some flood insurance, it was far from adequate for the cost of elevating her home and rebuilding the flood damage. Brenda and her son are living in the garage until the house is completed. We assisted Brenda with some framing inspection preparation, insulation and began installing new drywall on her ceilings. Brenda's home has received much attention from volunteers of Lend-A-Hand, the volunteer team from Carlisle Presbytery.

During our week in New Jersey we experienced frustration with the distance required between work sites and hoping for higher skilled work that we are used to. On the positive side, our team had a wonderful stay at the Point Pleasant Presbyterian Church with some of the nicest weather of any trip to date. We were able to see a large portion of the Jersey Shore and visited Sandy Hook and many shore towns. We had a wonderful mix of seasoned and new volunteers that created some great friendships that will last for years. Thanks to all who support our efforts!

Helping Those In Need Through Community Partnerships



The Mission Statement of East Stroudsburg Presbyterian Church challenges our members to serve humbly as the voice and hands of God in our community. Serving individuals and families who are struggling with homelessness, financial hardship, or addictive behavior has become a priority of our congregation. The church, located in the heart of East Stroudsburg, is well-situated to help those in need by partnering with local organizations.

For four weeks each year our church hosts Family Promise. Last year our members gave a total of 870 volunteer hours providing a safe place and good food for homeless families while parents learned new skills, furthered their education, and searched for work.

Each November school nurses at two East Stroudsburg elementary schools provide the Mission Committee with "wish lists" for children in four or five families who are struggling financially. Last year members donated nearly fifty wrapped gifts (including bicycles) to give ten children in four families a "Brighter Christmas."

Alcoholics Anonymous, Narcotics Anonymous, Al Anon, and Overeaters Anonymous meet daily or weekly for a total of twelve meetings each week in our church. People seeking help with addictions find our church to be a safe, non-judgmental place to receive support from those organizations on a continuing basis.

- East Stroudsburg Presbyterian Church that we may sustain our outreach to the community.



Go Figure - - - New worshipping communities start with mission

Recent interviews have revealed that worshipping communities tend to begin with a *mission* emphasis rather than a *worship* emphasis. In fact, they tend to see mission and evangelism as forms of worship. They strive to instill the Holy Spirit in as many hearts as possible by (1) offering time and energy in service to improving God’s kingdom on Earth, (2) communing in fellowship with those who have not yet been brought to grace, and (3) showing appreciation for all God has provided.

They honor God, they said, by being God’s “hands and feet.” And, through modeling this behavior publicly and around non-Christians, they hope to bring more people to God. The idea is to “show the gospel” before “telling about it.”

This means that not only are new worshipping communities energizing their sponsoring congregations, they are also reaching people who were previously unengaged with church.

2016 Standard Mileage Rates for Business, Medical and Moving Announced

IR-2015-137, Dec.17, 2015

WASHINGTON — The Internal Revenue Service today issued the 2016 optional standard mileage rates used to calculate the deductible costs of operating an automobile for business, charitable, medical or moving purposes.

Beginning on Jan. 1, 2016, the standard mileage rates for the use of a car (also vans, pickups or panel trucks) will be:

- 54 cents per mile for business miles driven, down from 57.5 cents for 2015
- 19 cents per mile driven for medical or moving purposes, down from 23 cents for 2015
- 14 cents per mile driven in service of charitable organizations

The business mileage rate decreased 3.5 cents per mile and the medical and moving expense rates decrease 4 cents per mile from the 2015 rates. The charitable rate is based on statute.

The standard mileage rate for business is based on an annual study of the fixed and variable costs of operating an automobile. The rate for medical and moving purposes is based on the variable costs.
