God reveals deep meaning in every event, the Spirit a lens by which we can understand so much more of life. We simply need to have eyes of the faith to see — which admittedly, is not that simple.

At the last Presbytery meeting, and then a few weeks later, events happened that have happened many times in the past, and will happen again many times in the future. In particular I am referring to the Presbytery’s approval of Sue Bennetch for ordination, and the laying on of hands that subsequently took place. But as much as I celebrate with Sue, this isn’t just about Sue. It is about Beth, Sameh, and Dave, and about Adam and John among others, whom you can read about in this newsletter. It is about a lot of people who are not in this newsletter. It is about *you*.

A lot of us celebrated with Sue because she’s been in the Presbytery for a long time, and because we’ve walked alongside her as she sought to fulfill her calling to become a Minister of Word and Sacrament. So to be there for the examination and the vote, to be there for questions asked and vows taken, is to see how seeds God has planted took root and are bearing fruit. It is special because the process of becoming a teaching elder is a public one, and we were in the audience as she walked that path. We celebrate with Beth just as much and thank God for the fruit being borne through her; the only difference is that we didn’t get to watch her life lived out before our eyes. We celebrate with Sameh and Dave just as much, even if the fruit God bears through them is

often out of our sight. That they are doing what God called them to do is reason enough to give thanks.

And in the same way, if we have eyes of faith, we will also celebrate with John and Adam, with other people in other churches who aren’t in the public eye of leading worship, we will celebrate with *you* as God works wonders through you, and as *you* allow God to use you as an instrument of God’s peace.

Will you let God use you to build up others, as you yourself have been built up? In the midst of life’s busy-ness, can you stop and be a sounding board, so someone else can hear their own dreams and visions? Can yours be a patient heart, to help another hear the plans that God has for them, plans for good and not for harm, for a future with hope?

Of all God’s creation, you may play the most important role in someone’s life, to be the one person who helps them discover God’s call in their lives. Think of the person you are, think of the ways in which you have been able to contribute to God’s Kingdom and to the lives of others. Remember the many words of encouragement and praying hearts that helped you to get to this place in your life.

Heidelberg Catechism explored

On March 26, 2013, the Rev. Dr. Brett Hendrickson, Assistant Professor of Religion at Lafayette College and member of Lehigh Presbytery, was featured in a live broadcast on the Heidelberg Catechism. Entitled “*A Small Beginning: Living Life in Gratitude to God and the new translation of the Heidelberg Catechism,*” this presentation was organized in anticipation of the Presbytery’s vote on amendments to that confessional document at the April 23, 2013 presbytery meeting.

Thanks to the technology and expertise provided by the Synod of the Trinity, there were viewers tuned in from throughout the Synod’s bounds, which stretch from West Virginia and the Upper Ohio Valley

through the whole of Pennsylvania. There was even a member of Newark Presbytery in the live audience!

This cross-boundary energy only added to what was a fine presentation by Brett in its own right. He covered three core topics: The role of the Book of Confessions in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.); an exploration of the Heidelberg Catechism; and the nature of the translation and translation issues in the Heidelberg Catechism specifically.

The April 23rd meeting of Lehigh Presbytery was held at the First Presbyterian Church of Allentown, where the assembled participated in a day full of worship, fellowship, and exploring (and contributing to) what God is doing in the world. As has become our practice, commissioners and guests gathered beforehand for a time of prayer for God's church, the world, and for ourselves. This time our prayer was accompanied by the church's Director of Music, John Richardson. At the same time others met in the Presbytery Office to watch a recording of Teaching Elder Brett Hendrickson's presentation on the Heidelberg Catechism, now shared with the entire Synod of the Trinity, in preparation for the vote on that faith statement later in the day.

Welcome and celebration were the order of the day. Commissioners welcomed Teaching Elder Sameh Bahkeet, a recent transfer into the Presbytery from the Presbytery of the Assuit of the Evangelical Presbyterian Church of Egypt; he is serving as a chaplain in the Reading area. Also welcomed was Teaching Elder David Watson, member of San Joaquin Presbytery, who is serving as Interim Pastor at First Presbyterian Church, Reading. Later in the day the Presbytery voted on two persons who will be joining us as teaching elders: Sue Bennetch, formerly a member of the First Presbyterian Church of Bethlehem and now a chaplain, and Beth Case, formerly under care of Beaver-Butler Presbytery, who is now a temporary supply Associate Pastor for Congregational Care at the Bethlehem church.

The Presbytery then turned to the one remaining overture from the General Assembly, regarding a proposed amendment to the *Book of Confessions*, specifically the Heidelberg Catechism. The Presbytery voted 59 to 13 in favor of the amendment. Other significant business of the day included amendment to the Presbytery's Dismissal Policy, paving the way for completion of the agreements with the Milford and Middle Smithfield churches.

Those assembled then worshipped God in the style of the Allentown church's "10:10" contemporary service, with Teaching Elder Tony Sundermeier preaching the sermon and music from John Richardson and Adam Tavolaro, Director of Alternative Worship, and the church's "10:10 Band" and Gospel Choir.

The service also included the commissioning of Teaching Presbyter and Stated Clerk Steve Shussett under the auspices of the C Change initiative, as he leads a new ministry called "The Cave." This is a weekly service, based on sacred reading, silence, and quiet contemplation. It will be offered weekly on Thursday evenings at 7 p.m. at the Faith Presbyterian Church in Emmaus.

Finally, those gathered continued in the conversations known as "Life Together in Lehigh Presbytery." Five breakout groups met to discuss the learnings from the

February presbytery meeting, focusing on Resources and Stewardship; Outreach and Evangelism; Mission; Changing Church in a Changing World; and Membership. The results from both the February and April conversations can be found on the Presbytery website, and reader contributions are

welcome.

Presbytery Commissioners enjoyed a delicious Middle Eastern dinner. Thank you to the First Presbyterian Church of Allentown for being such gracious hosts.

Tribute to Unsung Heroes

Barbara Quigg, a Ruling Elder at the First Presbyterian Church of Hokendauqua, was honored by Lehigh County Aging and Adult Services Department, at their fourteenth annual *Tribute to Unsung Heroes*. She was selected after having been nominated by the Westminster Village Auxiliary, of which she has been a member since 1988. Barbara worked as a secretary for Lehigh Presbytery for eleven and a half years before her retirement. She has been active in the leadership of Presbyterian Women in Lehigh Presbytery for several decades.

Rev. Shelton Waters Remembered

On Tuesday, April 2, 2013, Hazel Black and the Rev. Laddie Benton attended a Service of Witness to the Resurrection for the Rev. Shelton Bishop Waters (December 29, 1918—March 26, 2013) in Jenkintown, PA. Rev. Waters had served for several years as the Stated Supply Pastor for the Washington Presbyterian Church in Reading, PA.


Shelton B. Waters was born in Pittsburgh, PA to William and Margaret Waters on December 29, 1918. He married Rachel Tate in 1944. She preceded him in death.

Rev. Water's active ministry extended from 1945 through 1994. During this time he served as Pastor to the First African Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia, N.E. Presbyterian Church of Washington, D.C., Interim Pastor of T.M. Thomas

Presbyterian Church of Chester, PA, and Washington Presbyterian Church of Reading, PA.

His service to the Presbyterian Community included Moderator of the Philadelphia Presbytery in 1966 and Moderator of the Synod of the Trinity in 1967. He served as a Board Member of Foreign Missions, General Assembly Council, and Trustee of the Presbyterian Church (USA) Foundation. Shelton received Honorary D.D. degrees from Knoxville and Maryville Colleges. He is Pastor Emeritus of the First African Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia and N.E. Presbyterian Church of Washington, D.C.

He leaves to celebrate his memory a brother, sister-in-laws, nieces, nephews and a lot of friends.

MISSION GRANT TO CHURCH OF THE MOUNTAIN, DELAWARE WATER GAP, PA

The Congregation of the Presbyterian Church of the Mountain gives thanks for the mission grant from Lehigh Presbytery that enabled them to continue their ministry of medicines and covenant care and prayer with their Cuban amigos. They have a partner relationship with the congregation of the Juan G. Hall Church in Cardenas, Cuba. Since 1998, their Cuban amigos have welcomed them and treated them with Christian love and affection, like family, and the feelings are reciprocal.

Though the people in Cardenas have far fewer material goods, fewer opportunities for employment and economic progress than we do, they share willingly with what they have. The Church of the Mountain delegation was invited into their homes for Pastorals (worship and praise services in various home, for those unable to travel to the church or just wanting the joy of a small worship environment), for family celebrations, sharing musical events, sharing their food (which is rationed to them very strictly), and spending time sharing the love of Christ and the many blessings from God through conversation, Bible studies and informal gatherings.

The delegation had the opportunity to meet the new Pastor of the Juan G. Hall Church. Pastor Alison and his wife Sarahi and their young daughter Ana Paula are bringing new vitality to the church and are excited to continue the partnership relationship and deepen the commitments with the

Church of the Mountain. This March a meeting was held where Pastor Alison and his wife Sarahi told of new and exciting events occurring at the church, such as: music lessons, yoga classes and the wonderful new water system through Living Waters that brings fresh drinkable water to the church and community. The delegation from the Church of the Mountain presented information about their church, discussing size and surrounding communities and their many missions. They were amazed that a church of this size would be involved in so many outreach activities and said it will inspire them to expand their programs.

Since medicines are so difficult to attain and costly in time and money (even over-the-counter medications), what the Church of the Mountain was able to bring was valuable for the health of congregation and community in Cuba. The Juan G. Hall Church posts a list of currently available medications. There are several physicians in the congregation who monitor the requests for these medications.

The medicines are provided through MAP International. They provide "travel packs" of prescription drugs that are donated to MAP. The congregation of the Presbyterian Church of the Mountain sent a donation of \$1,000 to MAP for packing and shipping of \$16,000 worth of medications from MAP as well as hundreds of medications donated by congregation members. These medical supplies and the fresh drinking water program are helping daily to improve the health of the people of Cardenas.

C-CHANGE GRANT TO STEVE SHUSSETT FOR THE CAVE

Over fifteen years ago, I attended a contemplative prayer meeting of some 600 persons. Contemplative prayer” refers to ways in which one “rests in God” (a 4th century Christian definition), a *being with* rather than having to *do* things. Six hundred people in prayer — and you could have heard a pin drop. Seeds were planted in me, to see the many who feel drawn to this kind of silence in community, to wonder if we Presbyterians could, from “the innermost recesses of our hearts and from that place, not from the throat and tongue, call God” (John Calvin).

Thanks to the inspiration of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)’s *1001 New Worshiping Communities*, and especially Lehigh Presbytery and its C Change, these seeds planted so long ago could take root. I had the opportunity to share this idea with others and to really hear my vision, and to have others hold me accountable in doing my part in bringing it to life.

What is the Cave? My hope is that it will become a worshipping community built around silent prayer and our Reformed tradition, a place where people come together to rest with God in service to one

another and the world. Our worship will have the elements of worship we are used to as Presbyterians, but focus on speaking less and listening more, on resting with the One who loves us and who calls us to love in return.

I also intend to introduce more open and generous ways of having people pray with and for each other, and the world, witnessing to Christ and his prayer that God’s will be done. Could we pray for difficult or controversial matters on our heart with fear? Can we pray with someone even if we don’t agree with them? How would a visible presence of prayer change us and our communities?

Caves are dark and quiet, but full of life. There is birth, life, and new life in promised resurrection. We are protected there, from fire, storm, and wind. But there is also risk in a context of trust, to admit our fears and anxieties. A place of laying to rest unhealthy ideas about God, ourselves, and others. And caves connect: we don’t know the end, but we do know we are not alone. We look through a glass darkly, but we know Who is our Light.

The Cave meets at 7PM on Thursdays at Faith Presbyterian Church in Emmaus, 2nd and Cherokee. *Come and rest awhile.*

According to the sexual misconduct policy passed by Lehigh Presbytery in 2011, **ALL** Teaching Elders and Commissioned Ruling Elders are required to complete a healthy boundary training that is:

- at least six hours in duration and
- conducted in person (not electronic),
- and this must happen within four years of the policy's approval, that is, **by 2015.**




Where are the young adults?


