To all the Saints,

Grace to you all, and peace!

“I thank my God every time I think of you...” So begins Paul’s letter to the Philippians, and so begins my last note to you for a few months. Thanks to your generosity (since the Presbytery had to approve it), I will start a three-month sabbatical on October 1, returning to the office after the new year. There have been days when I couldn’t wait for this time of rest and renewal to start, and other days when there has been such excitement and energy that I just want to stay and be involved in this thing God is doing.

I’ve never had a sabbatical before, and I am grateful for the opportunity and the privilege. I wish that all of our pastors might be able to have such a time apart. Frankly, it would be good for everyone to step off of their own treadmills every once in a while. For those wondering what one does on a sabbatical, I have some plans now, well aware of the proverb, “We plan and God laughs.”

Having been a spiritual director for several years, and in direction even longer, I’ve been both witness to, and beneficiary of, what God can do through a gentle pace, silence, and trust. In this time away, I would like to consider how God might work through these ways of being in larger groups of people. How can a congregation, a presbytery, even a General Assembly sit

with God, and be attentive to how God sits with it?

At the same time, proud city boy that I am, being in the natural world has been a revelation to me. I’ve written before of my walks in the woods, and I look forward to continuing and expanding on these, with greater opportunity for reflection than I’ve had. Rather than “walk/pray, shower, rush to work,” now it can be “walk/pray...and what does this mean?”

My theology of prayer has long been that if we allow our hearts to be open to God, God, who knows every word before it passes our lips, can see all whom we do pray for, all who we would pray for and those we’ve forgotten in mind if not heart. People and places that have touched us and left a mark. Our minds can’t contain all of that, to pray for everyone would require that we stop and pray every minute of every day. But by grace, God peers into our openness, and sees all there is to see, spoken and unspoken. By grace, we do “pray without ceasing.”

“I thank my God every time I think of you...” As true as it has been, it will be all the more so now in this time of rest and reflection. When God looks into me, God will see all of you.

**Presbytery Highlights**

The September 24, 2013 Stated Meeting of Lehigh Presbytery was graciously hosted by the First Presbyterian Church of Hazleton, drawing commissioners from throughout the Presbytery. Many in attendance had never been to the church before, and were amazed at the size of the sanctuary, once home to the largest congregation in Lehigh. Commissioners were welcomed by Ruling Elders Jim Hoegg (former Presbytery moderator) and Jane Dougherty, and learned of the burgeoning Latino ministry, including a growing English as a Second Language program, funded in part by funds from the Presbytery and General Assembly, and they are hosting a Spanish speaking congregation, *Iglesia de Cristo Misionera*, who later provided wonderful, energetic music during the worship service. The Presbytery was also blessed to include among its numbers István Ferenc, Zsolt Fazakas, & Krisztina Fölöp, from College Hill Presbyterian Church's partner church in Romania.

Teaching Elder Steve Shussett, Teaching Presbyter and Stated Clerk, thanked the Presbytery for the gift of his upcoming sabbatical, and assured the assembled of his continued prayers while he is away. He also noted the ways in which the Presbytery and Synod of the Trinity will be caring for the Presbytery in his absence.

Teaching Elder RC Smith, Chair of the Presbytery Lead Team, facilitated this meeting's Presbytery Engagement, this time focusing on the Presbytery itself. Those assembled gathered in a variety of groupings to answer four questions: What is a presbytery? What are some of the essential functions or tasks of a presbytery? What is the purpose of a presbytery? What additional work could the presbytery do? The responses were collected and will be made available for the November presbytery meeting.

The Olivet United Presbyterian Church "Food Ministry" was recognized as the latest recipient of a \$5,000 C Change grant. This ministry will serve the hungry in the area of Easton around Olivet, in cooperation with other organizations. The grant provided means to purchase necessary kitchen equipment around which the

anticipated community will gather. Ruling Elder Barbara Finch and Teaching Elder Tillie Chase presented the church's plans to the Presbytery, and were later commissioned by Moderator Janet Ney during the worship service.

Ruling Elder Sally Heimbach, speaking on behalf of the Committee on Shared Gifts, informed the Presbytery that because of General Assembly deadlines on electing commissioners for the Detroit Assembly on June 14-21, 2014, the Presbytery deadline for submitting (self-) nominations is now **November 8, 2013**. The application forms can be found on the website, and Elder Heimbach, a former GA commissioner, is available to speak with those interested in attending.

The day's worship was centered around the upcoming observance of World Communion Sunday. Many thanks to Teaching Elder Cindy Simmons (First, Easton) who planned the service, and preached and sang the sermon. Teaching Elders Sue Bennetch and Cindy Simmons presided at the Table. In addition to the music by *Iglesia de Cristo Misionera*, Hazleton's organist, Dr. Joseph Jumpeter shared his gifts, both musically and in making the bread for Communion (and for dinner). Dinner itself was well appreciated by the many in attendance.

Following dinner, the Presbytery addressed several matters of business. Teaching Elder Steve Shussett, having made the last of eight presentations prior to the presbytery meeting, introduced an overture "to reclaim the church's primary role in Christian marriage by separating the sanctity of Christian blessing from legal civil marriage." After a healthy discussion, the Assembly voted, originally voting down the overture. Once it was clear that there was confusion on the floor, however, a motion to reconsider was passed. At this point the overture was approved with amendment. Should another presbytery concur with this overture, it will be considered by the General Assembly.

Teaching Elder Stephen Emick, chair of the Committee on Ministry, followed by

presenting minimum terms of call for 2014 (Salary and Housing \$43,478, Board of Pensions \$15,217 or 35% of salary). Pulpit Supply honoraria will remain at the current levels. The Presbytery then considered requests by the Church of the Mountain (Delaware Water Gap) and the First Presbyterian Church of Lehighton for permission to consider their current temporary pastors for installed positions, as is now possible in our Book of Order. The request for permission to consider these persons was granted.

Teaching Elder Tim Dooner, chair of the Committee on Preparation for Ministry, then presented Inquirer Emily Wasser, member of the First Presbyterian Church of Allentown, for permission to move to candidacy. Following questions on her motivation of call, Emily was soundly endorsed, and blessed in prayer by Teaching Elder Lindsay Harren-Lewis (First Presbyterian Church of Allentown).

Two first readings were provided by Ruling Elder Dave Boltz, Vice-Moderator of the Presbytery and Treasurer. He first presented the latest adjustments to the Presbytery's Dismissal Policy. This was followed by a report on the proposed 2014 budget, which elicited comments to be considered before the November Presbytery meeting. Both of these documents can be found on the Presbytery website, and comments on both are welcomed at [office@lehighpresbytery.org](mailto:office@lehighpresbytery.org).

The final action of the day concerned the proposal for the Presbytery to move to a unicameral government to be known as the Presbytery Lead Team (PLT), comprised of the current Board of Trustees and PLT. This proposal was being voted on after only one reading because of time constraints imposed on the Committee on Shared Gifts, should the proposal pass and take effect January 1. This one reading was done in accordance with the standing rules, having sent the documents out one month in advance. After amendment, the motion was approved by the Presbytery.

The meeting concluded at 9:15 p.m. with prayer by Teaching Elder Steve Shussett.

## Rhythm of the Synod—Stated Meeting of the Synod of the Trinity

On June 10–11, 2013 the Synod met at the Penn Stater Conference Center Hotel. As advertised, this Synod meeting was like no other previous meeting of the Synod. Worship and small group discussions dominated the time for the commissioners, visitors and staff. The flow of the meeting centered on Abram's journey (Genesis 12:1-9). As Abram's journey went by stages, from one point to another, so the synod meeting went by stages from business to worship, from small group table discussions to plenary, from a meeting setting to gathering around a "camp fire."

Warren Cooper served as the meeting facilitator and worship leader. The thematic scripture was read from various translations and in various voices. Warren's enthusiastic presence and music enabled energetic and spirit filled worship and transition from one stage of the journey to another.

Another factor in making this a different kind of meeting was the presence of colleagues from the Synods of the Northeast and the Covenant. The Synod of the Covenant was represented by: Raafat Zaki, Transitional Executive, Raafat's daughter Hanan Zaki, David Bartley, Stated Clerk & Treasurer and Russell Brandt, Moderator. The Synod of the Northeast was represented by Harold Delhagen, Transitional Leader. These guests were invited to open communication and relationships with neighboring regional mission partners in anticipation of the changing nature of synods which may be recommended to the next meeting of the General Assembly by the Mid-Council Commission.

The Synod Leadership Team, responding to what they heard from meetings with presbytery leadership groups the previous several months, recommended four priorities to guide the life and mission of the Synod as we journey into the future to which God is calling us.

The four priorities are:

**Connection/Partnership:** Action steps may include: communication, consultation and coaching, mentoring, networking, disaster response.

**Learning Together:** Action steps may include: Synod Big Tent (celebration!), various opportunities with specific topical emphasis, eg: building trust, justice, evangelism, stewardship, racial ethnic, spiritual development, children and youth, leader training.

**Incarnational Ministry:** Action steps may include: missional church, mission action, 1001 worshipping communities.

**Engaging a Larger Picture:** Action steps may include: challenging with new ideas, brokering best practices, partnering with presbyteries for leadership transitions, structural review, strategic decisions and consultative services.

Participants later gathered in self-selected small groups around each of the four priorities to consider and suggest ways each of the priorities be brought to life as we continue our journey.

The Synod was blessed by the presence of The Rev. Neal Presa, Moderator of the 220th General Assembly. Neal has been very active serving as an ambassador of the PC(USA) traveling extensively among the presbyteries and internationally strengthening our mission partnerships. Neal addressed the Synod calling us to be an Easter people in a Good Friday world. The Church has a message of hope which is critically needed in the midst of all the news and experiences of hopelessness in the world.

Actions taken by the Synod were:

- A. To designate the offering to be taken during the worship for Presbyterian Disaster Assistance relief efforts following the Oklahoma tornados.
- B. Approved the report of the Nominating Committee in electing members to the following positions :
  - a. **Grants and Scholarships Committee** Christopher Sanner, Ruling Elder, Washington Presbytery, Class 2013 - first term
  - b. **Nominating Committee**
    - i. Graham Robinson, Teaching Elder, Philadelphia Presbytery, Class of 2013
    - ii. Myrtle McCall, Teaching Elder, Carlisle Presbytery, Class of 2014
- C. Affirmed the work of the Synod Leadership Team in presenting the four priorities.
- D. Approved the 2014 Per Capita amount of \$2.20.
- E. Approved a change in the position description of the Synod Associate Executive, Susan Wonderland, to include, *Will provide 10 hours of professional coaching to leaders within the bounds of the Synod each month at their request.*
- F. Voted to extend indefinitely the service of Wayne Yost as acting stated clerk in light of Lesley Shoup's continued medical leave.

Following worship, which included the Eucharistic Celebration, the Synod gathering adjourned until the 2013 Fall Stated Meeting which is slated for October 28-29, beginning at 1:00 pm on the 28th. Location will be the Penn Stater Conference Center and Hotel in State College, PA.
